Executive Director's Report: 2008-2009

FY 2008 was another year of significant accomplishment for the Capitol Region Education Council. CREC ended 2008 -09 with an operating budget of \$150 million. We employed more than 1,600 people and offered our districts more than 125 programs and services. We contained our leadership budget to 4.5% of our operating budget. As a result, our indirect costs to members averaged 5% compared to the 8.85% approved in FY 2008. CREC schools also made significant strides in closing the achievement gap and our student achievement scores exceeded state averages.

The Division of Student Services expanded programming in several areas. The River Street's "Annex" building was renamed the Marcia Yulo Howard Center for Autism. The center houses classrooms for younger students transitioning to River Street School, PASC (Program for the Assessment of Special Children), the Children's Therapy Services Clinic for children with sensory

issues, and administrative offices for River Street's Autism Outreach program and the Integrated Program Models (IPM). The Farmington Valley Diagnostic Center plans to expand its services to elementary age students with social, emotional, and behavioral concerns. The Center is also enhancing its transitional services to students and will provide additional opportunities for community internships and work experience. The John J. Allison Jr. Polaris Center recently expanded its clinical staff at the Mental Health Outpatient Clinic to include practitioners with experience in working with students and families with hearing loss. The clinic has also hired bilingual therapists to better meet the needs of Spanish speakers. Soundbridge is now training its third class of students in a master's program called Aural Habilitation and Evaluation of Hearing Impaired Children. The state-approved project to almost double the size of Soundbridge is slated for a February 2010 completion date.

The Division of Technical Assistance and Brokering Services (TABS): A major focus of this year's work involved assisting districts and schools with the planning and implementation of Scientific Research-Based Interventions (SRBI). SRBI is a service delivery structure of increasing levels of instruction and support matched to students' needs. This system of monitoring the student's "response" to appropriate instruction provides an accurate picture of the student's learning rates over time. In more than 40 schools, districts, and educational organizations, the TABS consultants provided SRBI activities such as facilitation of district level planning meetings, school-based professional development, and the creation of a well defined district SRBI plan. Eight hundred copies of the RTI manual, written by a TABS senior education specialist, were distributed to schools in Connecticut and other states. Additional initiatives included activities which resulted in a five-year approval from the State Department of Education to provide an Alternative Route to Certification (AARC) for special education, approval from Charter Oak State College to provide six accredited courses for paraprofessionals, and the state-sponsored COMPASS paraprofessional training of 30 staff from the RESCs, SERC, and districts in a "train-the-trainer" model. The COMPASS training resulted in over 300 paraprofessionals receiving professional development in the COMPASS modules. Modules that focused on increasing the benefit and effectiveness of Individual Education Plans for students with disabilities were provided to over 200 district staff. TABS ran its first online summer school using the Virtual Learning Academy. The brokering of over 100 staff such as paraprofessionals, speech and language pathologists, administrators, and other "hard to find" educational personnel provided districts in the state and beyond with needed staffing support.

The Institute of Teaching and Learning worked to meet the needs of our districts as well as CREC's magnet schools by providing multiple professional development and on-site coaching opportunities. Our education specialists provided services including workshop trainings, coaching, and on-site consultation. Specific areas included Differentiated Instruction, Curriculum Development, Classroom Walkthrough, Data-Driven Decision Making, and Effective Teaching Strategies. Professional staff from the Institute of Teaching and Learning worked closely with the School Improvement Unit of the Connecticut State Department of Education to provide more than 200 days of training and technical assistance to schools that have been identified as "in need of improvement." The Institute also provided numerous workshops in the region with national and local speakers.

The Grants and Development Office was successful in securing a \$100,000 Early Reading Success grant from the State Department of Education for the University of Hartford Magnet School. Throughout the course of the 2008-2009 school year, this grant enabled the implementation of a wide variety of activities and support that led to unprecedented gains in literacy throughout the entire school. Prior to SY 2008-2009, of all the CREC magnet schools, the University of Hartford Magnet School had the largest achievement gap between Asian/White students and students of color. This gap closed dramatically and led to the school making Adequate Yearly Progress as determined by the 2009 Connecticut Mastery Tests.

Before the beginning of the 2008-2009 school year, the Capitol Region Education Council (CREC) was awarded a grant from the State Department of Education's Bureau of Special Education to implement a regional transportation pilot program for special education students from the following districts: East Windsor, Enfield, Windsor, Windsor Locks and Newington.

The pilot program, according to the participating districts, was a success. In all, the districts saved over \$134,000 by the end of the 2008-2009 school year. All ride times were under one hour in duration. District and parent satisfaction were high.

The Grants and Development Office has established a cadre of grant writers who are regularly brokered out to CREC school districts. This year, multiple grants were written for Portland, Enfield, and Hartford.

The Division of Technology Services provided professional development to teachers and administrators in more than 40 districts, enabling them to define and develop 21st century skills aligned with the Connecticut Frameworks. Data management services improved school efficiencies and provided greater insight into student performance. Technology Services staff also assisted districts with their completion of their three-year strategic technology plans. The division expanded its services to districts and partner organizations by providing on-demand and full-time outsourced technical expertise at below-market rates; expanding the Microsoft School Agreement, which saved districts more than \$3 million over the past four years; and helping schools run more cost-effectively by offering a comprehensive technology audit service.

The Facilities and Operations division continues to provide services for capital replacement planning. The program provides an assessment of the mechanical, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, roofing, flooring, window, etc. systems in each building. A formal report indicates the condition of each system, the remaining life expectancy and the repair/replacement costs for each item identified. The end product for our districts is a planning/management tool that can be used to systematically plan for capital needs over a five-year period.

School Construction had another productive year and is nearing the completion of two projects: the expansion and renovation of Soundbridge, as well as the construction of the new Lyman Hall High School Vocational-Agricultural Center in Wallingford. In addition, our staff will be assisting Glastonbury with the construction of the new East Hartford-Glastonbury Elementary Magnet School. The department is also deeply involved in helping Bloomfield manage three of their school construction projects – the Carmen Arace Intermediate School and the Metacomet and Laurel Elementary Schools. We continue in our efforts to provide districts with energy conservation programs and will be rolling out a new program that provides new roofing and solar energy to school districts for less than it would cost for the roof alone.

The Division of Magnet Schools served 4,745 students from every member district through its schools and programs. CREC opened three early childhood schools and the Public Safety Academy, a middle-high school for students in grades 6-12. In addition, the Greater Hartford Academy of Math and Science (GHAMAS) expanded to include a full-day program for middle and high school students. Several of the magnet schools were honored for their achievements during the 2008-2009 school year. The Metropolitan Learning Center (MLC) was recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as one of eight successful magnet schools in the country. This school also earned the Global Classroom Award from the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel and was recognized by ConnCAN for the achievement of its African-American students on the Connecticut Mastery Test. MLC and East Hartford-Glastonbury Magnet Schools were both recognized as Magnet Schools of Excellence by Magnet Schools of America.

As NASA Explorer Schools, EHGEMS, Two Rivers, and GHAMAS sent teachers to conduct student-created experiments in zero gravity. In addition to its awards, two magnet schools received recognition for their work with students. The University of Hartford Magnet School was awarded the Early Reading Success Grant by the State of Connecticut. The International Magnet School for Global Citizenship was granted candidacy for International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme. During 2008-2009, CREC also ran the state's largest Open Choice Program, transporting 1,139 students to 140 schools in 27 districts. It also managed 37 interdistrict programs.

CREC staff and programs shall work with local school systems to meet their needs and the needs of students.


- Each student in the public schools of the Capitol Region will demonstrate learning at ever higher levels.

How CREC Assesses Needs and Sets Priorities

CREC has long valued partnership building, listening and probing for understanding, and collaboration as it responds to the needs of its various clients. During 2007-2008, CREC continued to rely on feedback from:

- Advisory Committees that helped set program-specific priorities with direct service programs.
- CREC's Council, representing Board of Education members from urban, suburban, and rural districts, who meet monthly to discuss problems affecting education in our region and direct CREC to pursue an active role in providing high quality, cost-effective solutions. A Council retreat is held each year to set organizational direction.
- CREC's Professional Advisory Board, composed of superintendents who offer an administrative perspective of needs assessment.
- State agency needs assessments and planning documents as they reflect the needs of the Capitol Region and Connecticut.
- Strategic Plans of such organizations as the Capitol Region Partnership and its member agencies, the Connecticut State Department of Education comprehensive plans, and school district planning documents and superintendent reports.
- Ongoing meetings held with local staff: superintendents (Hartford Area Superintendents' Association); curriculum directors (Curriculum Council); special education directors (ConnCASE); personnel directors (Human Resources Council), and monthly meetings with the state education commissioner.
- CREC, as a charter member of the Capitol Region Partnership, meets monthly with other regional service
 agencies to determine needs and ways those needs can be met through cooperative efforts.

Information from these and other sources is analyzed and synthesized by the CREC Cabinet: the executive director, deputy executive director, assistant executive director for finance and operations, director of student services, general director of magnet schools, managing director of human resources, and director of human resources.


